"Lycidas" (/ ʔ ɪ ʔ s ʔ d ʔ s /) is a poem by John Milton, written in 1637 as a pastoral elegy. It first appeared in a 1638 collection of elegies, entitled *Justa Edouardo King Naufrago*, dedicated to the memory of Edward King, friend of Milton's at Cambridge who drowned when his ship sank in the Irish Sea off the coast of Wales in August 1637.
